

ACHIEVEMENT AWARD RULES
(5-Minute Speaking Contest)

Achievement Award for Club Activity (5-MINUTE SPEAKING CONTEST) is to be given for an oral presentation of an activity of the club. The participant shall limit his presentation to that phase of the activity that has been completed during the current club year.

1. Lion, Lioness and Leo participants in this Contest are the winners, or in the case where the winner is unable to compete in the Multiple District Contest, the runner-up, of the respective contests at the individual District Conferences. **THE DISTRICT GOVERNOR MUST SEND THE NAME OF THE WINNER AND RUNNER-UP TO THE MD19 CONTESTS AND AWARDS CHAIRPERSON AND MULTIPLE DISTRICT 19 OFFICE BY APRIL 30.** No District shall provide more than one participant for this Contest.
2. The time for presentation shall be limited to 5 minutes. A penalty of 5 points for each minute, or fraction thereof, shall be assessed against a speaker running over the 5-minute limit.
3. 25% is allowed for oral presentation
75% is allowed for relative value of activity.
4. **THE CONTESTS & AWARDS COMMITTEE SHALL PROVIDE THREE (3) JUDGES.** The three judges shall judge the oral presentation, taking into consideration the physical appearance of the speaker, presence, voice, methods employed, and the general effectiveness of the presentation. At the conclusion of the contest, their ranking shall be on the basis of 25% as the highest possible percentage to be given.
5. The three judges shall judge the relative value of the activity. They shall grade on the basis of 75% as the highest grade. They shall take into consideration the nature of the activity, the service to the club itself, the service to the community, the size of the club, the effort required by the club, and the permanent benefits to the club and to the community keeping in mind that what may be of great service to one community might not be the same service to another community.

CLUB BULLETIN AWARD RULES

One Award each for Lion, Lioness and Leo Clubs.

To qualify for this Award:

1. A Club must publish **at least 10 bulletins a year.**
2. A copy of each bulletin must be sent to the Club's District Governor and to the Multiple District 19 Office. Emailed copies will be printed by the MD19 Office in black and white. Clubs who produce their bulletins in color may choose to submit a hard copy in color for judging.

Lion, Lioness and Leo participants in the MD19 level of this Contest are the district winners judged from all of the District Governor's copies of the club bulletins. In the event the winning club bulletin has not been sent to the MD19 Office, the runner up bulletin shall be considered the winner of the District contest. **The District Governor shall submit the name of the District winner and runner up to the MD19 Contests and Awards Chairperson and the Executive Secretary by April 30.**

The Executive Secretary will supply from the files in the MD19 Office, 6 consecutive issues of each District's winning club bulletin to the MD19 Contests and Awards Committee for judging at the multiple district level.

THE CONTESTS & AWARDS COMMITTEE MAY APPOINT A COMMITTEE TO JUDGE THIS CONTEST.

The judges shall base their scoring of each bulletin on the following POINTS system (with 100 points being considered perfect), and distributed in the following manner:

POINTS

GENERAL APPEARANCE OF THE BULLETIN25

Does the bulletin appear, at first glance, as a credit to the club and to Lionism in general? The paper should reveal some balance or other planned make-up, care in detailed arrangements, local artwork, clean-cut impression, good paper stock, and avoidance of smudginess or illegibility. The month and year of the bulletin and the name of the Editor MUST appear on the first page of the bulletin.

BUILDING OF VITAL LIONISM30

Does the bulletin boost the local club and all worthwhile activities that it does, or is it a "knocker's sheet"? Does it acknowledge and aid the causes of Lions International? Does the bulletin report, foreshadow or otherwise aid by editorial news, or other comment, the Lions projects? Does the bulletin lead in helping to build, as well as maintain, local plans and projects? Does it do a good job of promoting?

INCREASING LIONS' GOODWILL AND STRENGTH25

Is the bulletin truly democratic in mentioning many members and helping to become the forum for all? Does it add to the club, fun and camaraderie? Is the fun kept within sufficient bounds so as to avoid

real mental injury to any Lion? Does the bulletin call for the efforts of many in the club? Does the bulletin build toward the meeting?

POINTS

SETTING OF HIGH STANDARDS 20

Is the bulletin well-written technically, well-edited, and headlined? The bulletin does not need to conform to the writing standards of a metropolitan daily, but, some penalty should be exacted for bad spelling, faulty grammar, and confusing construction. Clarity, simplicity, accuracy, and completeness should be rewarded. Striking composition should be recognized.

A club, if it chooses, may submit with the bulletins, brief additional information which will help the judges to judge it fairly. Such notes might include information about how it is distributed and to whom (for instance, is it sent regularly to military members?). Facts might be included regarding how it is edited. Does one member serve continuously as Editor, or is the editorship rotated?

ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS FOR BULLETIN CONTEST

A GOOD BULLETIN...

Should identify itself with an attractively printed or mimeographed heading which is descriptive of the purposefulness of Lions. The heading should be dignified and worthy of Lions. Facetious titles should be avoided lest they become offensive with repetition.

A GOOD BULLETIN...

Should, at first glance, be attractive in form, be brief, concise, and regularly published. It should be informative and inspirational. First in importance is the announcement of coming programs, with enough zest in the announcement to stimulate attendance. The coming program should be adequately publicized in a brief and concise manner yet it should tell something about the speaker, or other participants who will comprise the program.

A GOOD BULLETIN...

Should provide only a brief rehash of the past meeting, highlighting only the outstanding phases of the former program - just enough to make absentees wish they had been there. It should list new members and provide a short biography of each. It should provide a brief running history of the club, which is preserved as a permanent record of club accomplishments and achievements.

It should carry news and announcements of club and zone affairs. It should copy pertinent information from the Multiple District Bulletin.

CLUB EXCELLENCE AWARD RULES

The Club Excellence Award will be based on the following criteria and will be awarded at the Fall Forum.

- Membership Growth: A net gain of one (1) member will be realized by the end of the year, July 1 – June 30. **20 pts**
- Leadership Preparation: The Club President, Vice President(s), Secretary, Treasurer and Membership Director will attend a Club Officer Training after their club election and prior to September 30th of the Lions year in which they serve.
(3 points each, up to a maximum of 15 pts)
- Setting Club Priorities: A minimum of one three-hour planning session will be held during the Lions year and will be attended by a majority of club members. **15 pts**
If using an outside facilitator. **5 pts**
- Club Activities: At least one fund-raising project and one service project held during the Lions year. **15 pts**
- District Spring Conference: The club will have at least two members registered at the District Spring Conference, one (1) of whom is an Officer of the Club. These two (2) members will not be a Zone Chairperson or District Governor. **20 pts**
- Contests and Awards Participation: The club will participate in at least one (1) Contests and Awards competition at their District Spring Conference. **20 pts**
- Communication:
 1. The Club will publish a monthly newsletter with copies distributed to the District Governor, Vice District Governor, Zone Chairperson, Multiple District 19 Office, club members and others as desired. **20 pts**
 2. The Club will publish and distribute a club brochure at club functions. The club brochure must be submitted to the MD19 Office by April 30th. **15 pts**

Maximum point value is 145 points, with a minimum of 115 points needed to qualify for this award. All Clubs who meet the above criteria must submit a Club Excellence Award form to the Multiple District 19 Office postmarked by July 31st

of the following Lions year. **The Multiple District 19 Office will mail out this form to all clubs in March.**

SECRETARY EXCELLENCE AWARD RULES

To all Lions Club Secretaries who qualify for this honor, Multiple District 19 presents a Secretary' Excellence Award at the Fall Forum following their term of office. This Award shall be given by the Contests & Awards Committee based on the statistical record of the MD19 Office for the period of July 1 to June 30. A Charter Secretary of a club is eligible to receive this Award if the Club's Charter Night is held prior to October 1, and a minimum of 267 points is earned. Questions concerning the decision of the Committee must be sent in writing to the MD19 Contests & Awards Chairperson by December 31, of the year in which the Secretary's term of office is completed.

TO QUALIFY FOR THIS AWARD, A MINIMUM OF 267 POINTS MUST BE EARNED FROM THE FOLLOWING:

POINTS

1. The Secretary shall have served faithfully and diligently, for a minimum of six (6) months, during his/her term of office as attested to by the Club President.

2. **SUBMISSION OF MONTHLY MMR & VAD REPORTS BY CLUB**
 - A. Monthly reports submitted to MD19 Office. **.60**
(5 points per month)

 - B. Reports must be postmarked by the 20th of the current month if mailed or received by the MD19 Office by the last day of the current month if emailed or faxed.
(2 points per month) 24

3. **COMPLETION OF MONTHLY MEMBERSHIP REPORT (MMR)**
 - Statistical Club and Secretary Data **.48**
Complete with name of Club, District and Secretary (address also required). Complete membership activity and support information for membership changes.
(4 points per month)

4. **COMPLETION OF VISITATIONS, ACTIVITIES & DONATIONS REPORT (VAD) 36**
 - A. Club visitations, activities and donations must be reported for each month in the appropriate section of the VAD report form. If there is no activity, it should be so stated on the appropriate section of the VAD report. **(3 points per month)**

SECRETARY EXCELLENCE AWARD RULES – Continued

- B. ONLY 1 point will be awarded if the VAD report is not in the format provided each year by the MD19 Office. A secretary may create a form on a computer if it follows the standard MD19 format or download the form from the MD19 Web Site.
- C. NO points will be awarded if the report is NOT received in the MD19 Office by the 5th of the month following the month of visitations.

5. CLUB ACTIVITIES SUMMARIES 25

- A. A summary of the year's activities shall be prepared by the Secretary and received by the MD19 Office, with a copy to the District Governor, no later than July 31st. A sample summary report and format are included in this Contests and Awards Book following the Secretary's Efficiency Award Winners. **(20 points)**
- B. The Annual Lions Club Activities Report, provided by Lions Club International, shall be prepared by the Club Secretary and received by the MD19 Office with a copy to the District Governor no later than July 31st. **(5 points)**

6. ZONE, DISTRICT AND MULTIPLE DISTRICT MEETINGS 50

- A. He/she shall attend at least 2 out of 3 Zone Meetings for his/her Zone and be represented by a member of his/her club if absent from the 3rd. 5 points for each Zone Meeting (MAX 3) based on the Zone Chairperson's Zone Meeting Report Form supplied by the MD19 Office. **(Max. 15 points)**
- B. He/she shall attend his/her District Conference during his/her term of office. 10 points for attending based on the District Governor's Conference Report. **(10 points)**
- C. He/she shall attend either the MD19 Annual Convention or Fall Forum during his/her term of office. 10 points for either based on the records of the MD19 Office. **(10 points)**
- D. He/She shall attend a secretary training session at the zone or district level. Attendance at the meeting will be reported on the Zone Chairperson leadership training form. If the training session was not held by the preceding Zone Chairperson, or by the District, the current Zone Chairperson, or the District, may hold a training session by September 30th. A secretary may attend and receive these points. **(15 points)**

 - a. REGULAR Lions Club or Club Branch meeting;
 - b. CHARTER PRESENTATION NIGHT;
 - c. CHARTER ANNIVERSARY NIGHT of other clubs;
 - d. INSTALLATION of another club;
 - e. ZONE MEETING of own zone;
 - f. ZONE MEETING of another zone, EXCEPT when held in connection with a District Conference;
 - g. FALL FORUM
 - h. MULTIPLE DISTRICT ANNUAL CONVENTION;
 - i. DISTRICT CABINET MEETING; AND
 - j. SUB-DISTRICT SPRING CONFERENCE.
 - k. Lion's participation in a zone, a district or another club's service project(s) and/or fundraising activity(ies). Since more than one club may be involved in a single project or activity, all points will be calculated as if it were one visit. Mileage points will be determined based on the location of the project itself, which may or may not be the meeting location(s) of the club(s) involved. If the project or activity itself involves traveling, calculate mileage from your club's meeting location to the start point of the project or activity.

To receive credit, visits must be made within the boundaries of Multiple District 19 or within 50 miles of the home club IF OUTSIDE the Multiple District. No visiting club shall be given credit for more than three visitations to any one club in any one year. Points will NOT be allowed for special club

meetings held in conjunction with the Fall Forum a District Conference, or the Annual Convention.

2. The following is a list of the points that a club will receive for their visitations:

a) Membership

2 Members	200 Points	3 Members	300 Points

(Maximum number of members for points is 6)

VISITATION AWARD RULES - continued

b) Mileage

Road mileage points computation shall be as follows:

1. Ten (10) points per mile. Distance to be calculated from club meeting place to club meeting place.
2. Ferry travel, where applicable, shall receive 30 points; airplane travel, 60 points.

c) Program

100 Points to the visiting club if they provide the COMPLETE PROGRAM; i.e. the speaker, at a regular club meeting unless the speech is given by one of the officers listed in Rule #3.

Visitation Formula: (# members X 100) + (mileage X 10) + ferry and/or air travel + any complete program = total for each visit.

3. International Director, Council Chairperson, and District Governor, can not be counted as part of their home club's visiting delegation any time during their year(s) in office.
4. No points allowed to a club when they disband their regular meeting and make a visitation.
5. No points allowed for a visiting group of Lions unless they attend the FULL MEETING of the club they visit.
6. Visitations MUST be reported at the end of the month in which the visitation is made - in THE VISITATION SECTION OF THE VAD REPORT.
7. The following information MUST appear in THE VISITATION SECTION OF THE VAD REPORT.

8. If a club changes its regular meeting date to another date for any reason, notice must be given to the Multiple District 19 Office in sufficient time for publication in the MD19 bulletin PRECEDING the club meeting change so all Lions in the Multiple District are advised and thereby able to receive visitation points in the Visitation Contest.

PLEASE NOTE: The MD19 Bulletin is published every other month beginning in August.

VISITATION AWARD RULES Continued

RULES FOR VISITS MADE OUTSIDE MULTIPLE DISTRICT 19 BOUNDARIES:

1. One or more club members visiting any Lions Club in the world outside Multiple District 19's boundaries and more than 50 miles round trip from the home club will receive 25 points for each club visited. (No mileage points are given.) If the same club is visited more than once in a month, only one visit will be credited with 25 points. The visitations must be reported in the month following the visitation.
2. 25 points will be given for visiting the LIONS INTERNATIONAL HEADQUARTERS in Oak Brook, Illinois, but no mileage will be given.

VISITATION EXCELLENCE AWARD RULES

“Just Two a Month!”

This contest will encourage Lions Clubs in MD19 to

- Visit other Lions clubs within MD19 more often.
- Achieve a minimum number of visitations in a Lions year.
- Qualify a Lions Club with the minimum number of visitations for a special banner patch.

With the catch phrase, “Just Two A Month”, clubs are made aware that they only need to do an AVERAGE of two visitations per month (not including the summer) to earn this banner patch.

To be eligible for the Visitation Excellence Award Patch, Clubs must:

1. Visit 20 different Lions Clubs in a Lions year (July 1 - June 30th)
2. Include a visit to each club in their own zone
3. Report visits on a VAD as per normal requirements
4. Follow the regular rules of the MD19 Visitation Award except that mileage is not a factor, just the visit

Each club will be sent a form to fill out and submit to the MD19 office by July 31st. Qualifying clubs will be announced in the Border Crossing and the appropriate number of banner patches will be mailed to the current District Governor for presentation to the club. The first time a club qualifies, the main award patch is presented. After the initial patch, the club will receive a smaller patch with the appropriate year printed on it.

ZONE CHAIRPERSON EXCELLENCE AWARD RULES

To all Zone Chairperson who qualify for this honor, Multiple District 19 presents a gold Zone Chairperson Excellence Award at the Fall Forum following their term of office. This Award shall be given by the Contests and Awards Committee based on the statistical record of the MD19 Office for the period of July 1 through June 30. Questions concerning the decisions of this Committee must be sent in writing to the MD19 Contests and Awards Committee Chairperson before December 31 of the year in which the Zone Chairperson served.

TO QUALIFY FOR THIS AWARD, the Zone Chairperson must have been elected by September 1, of his/her year in office and a minimum of **640 points** must have been earned from the following:

POINTS

1. He/she shall attend the following meetings:
 - a. The Annual Convention during his/her year in office or **25**
Zone Chairperson's School at the Annual Convention
immediately preceding his/her year in office;
 - b. The Fall Forum during his/her term of office; **25**
 - c. His/her District Conference during his/her term of office; **25**
 - d. District Cabinet Meetings **(15 points each) MAX 45**

2. He/she shall write ten (10) newsletters to each of **60**
his/her clubs (July through June inclusive) with copies to
the District Governor and Multiple District 19 Office.

3. He/she shall make one Official visit to each club in **100**
his/her Zone. If possible, it should be made before the
District Governor's Official Visit. Club Branches, status
quo or problem clubs are included in visitation schedule.
These visits must be reported on the Zone
Chairperson's Monthly Report Form provided by the
MD19 Office. (If not all clubs visited a % of the 100
points is given)

4. He/she will be present and introduce the District Governor **100**
on his/her Official Visit, or make suitable arrangements.
These visits must be reported on the Zone Chairperson's
Monthly Report Form provided by the MD19 Office.
(If not all clubs visited or arrangements made, a % of the
100 points is given.)

ZONE CHAIRPERSON EXCELLENCE AWARD RULES

Continued.

POINTS 60

5. Each month he/she shall report on a Zone Chairperson's Monthly Report Form provided by the MD19 Office, all visitations made during that month. This form must be sent to his/her District Governor with a copy to the MD19 Office postmarked by the 10th of the month following the visitations. (Assure that visitations are noted in the proper block on Form)
6. All Club MMR & VAD Reports shall be accounted for throughout the year. The Reports must be submitted by the individual clubs in the zone and postmarked by the 20th day of the current month or received in the MD19 Office by the end of the current month if emailed or faxed. A prorated share of points will be awarded based on the number of reports received "On Time" (full credit), "Late" Reports (half credit) or "No" Report (No Credit) and the number of reports due. In all cases where reports are delinquent, the Zone Chairperson shall inform the MD19 Office by the 10th of the following month as to what action he/she took to obtain the report.
7. He/she shall hold and conduct 3 Zone Meetings by April 30 of his/her year.
8. He/she shall report his/her Zone Meetings to the MD19 Office within 30 days on the Zone Meeting Report Forms supplied by the MD19 Office.
9. The Club Officer Report Forms (P.U.19) for all Lions, Lioness and Club Branch Clubs in his/her Zone must be sent to the MD19 Office postmarked on or before April 30. Points are determined by the % of clubs in the Zone reporting on time.

MAX 15

The Club Officer Report Forms (P.U.19) are to be forwarded to the Zone Chairperson's successor by May 30 along with a form to be sent to the MD19 Office signed by his/her/ successor indicating the Club Officer Report Forms have been received. This form will be sent to the Zone Chairperson at the same time the Club Officer Report Forms are sent to the Lions Clubs.

10. He/she will have submitted the name, address, etc. **20**
of his/her successor to the MD19 Office by April 30,
if his/her successor has been elected.

11. All active clubs in his/her Zone must be in good **MAX 25**

year in office. Good financial standing means that all
charges through the month of June have been cleared.
Points are determined by the % of clubs in the Zone in
good financial standing on June 30.

12. He/she will provide a Club Officer Training Session **25**
after Club Officer Elections and prior to June 30 of the
Zone Chairperson's term of office, unless a District
Leadership Training meeting is held during that time.
The Club Officer Training form must be sent to the
MD19 Office on or before July 15th.

If Zone Chairperson attends the Club Officer Training Session. **5**
(Training Session, Zone Chairperson attendance and
Club Presidents and Secretaries at the Training
Session will be reported on a Form provided by the
Multiple District 19 Office.)

The selection of the Zone Chairperson of the Year Award Winners shall be made by the Contests and Awards Committee based on the statistical records of the Multiple District 19 Office through June 30. The winner(s) will be named each year for each of the categories listed above and the awards will be given at the Fall Forum. To be eligible for the Zone Chairperson of the Year Award, the Zone Chairperson must have qualified as a

100% Zone Chairperson with additional points to be earned as follows:

6. CLUB PLANNING SESSION 25

25 points will be awarded if all clubs within his/her Zone have held a Club Planning Session within the Lions year. A percentage of the 25 points will be awarded based on the percentage of the clubs in his/her zone that hold a Club Planning Session.

The following items will be used to break a tie, if one occurs, in the order that they are written:

1. Attendance at the required meetings.
2. Completion of all required visitations, as taken from required written reports received at MD19 Office.
3. Held a Zone/District Leadership Training Session and reported it in writing to the MD19 Office on or before July 15th.
4. Has completed a monthly Zone Bulletin and sent it to the MD19 Office.
5. His/her Zone's Clubs in good financial standing on June 30 as taken from Club VAD Reports (donation section) sent to the MD19 Office.
6. Monthly Zone Reports completed and sent to the MD19 Office.
7. Zone's Club's Club Officer Report Forms (P.U. 19) sent to MD19 Office on time.
8. Zone's Club's MMR and VAD Reports received at MD19 Office as required.
9. Zone's Clubs participated in the Contests and Awards at the District Conference and reported this on the VAD Report, visitation section.

ZONE CHAIRPERSON NEWSLETTER AWARD RULES

One award will be given to the Zone Chairperson creating the best Zone Newsletter in MD19 based on the criteria listed below.

To qualify for this award:

1. A Zone Chairperson must publish a newsletter at least once a month, for each month of their term.
2. A copy of each bulletin must be sent to their District Governor and to the Multiple District 19 Office. Emailed copies will be printed by the MD19 Office in black and white. Zone Chairpersons who produce their bulletins in color may choose to submit a hard copy in color for judging.

Participants at the MD19 level of this contest are the District winners judged from all of the Zone Chairperson newsletters sent to the District Governor. In the event the winning Zone Chairperson newsletter for a District has not been sent to the MD19 office, the runner up bulletin from that district shall be considered the winner of the District contest.

The District Governor must submit the name of the District winner and runner up to the MD19 Contests and Awards Chairperson and the Multiple District 19 Office by April 30th.

The Executive Secretary will verify the winning District newsletters have been received each month by the MD19 Office. The MD19 office will then supply 6 consecutive issues from their files to the MD19 Contests and Awards Committee for judging at the MD level. Judging will take place at the MD19 Annual Convention.

The judges shall base their scoring of each bulletin on the following points system (with 100 points being considered perfect):

GENERAL APPEARANCE OF THE NEWSLETTER.....25

Newsletter will be neat, clean, printed on good paper stock, use attractive artwork, and be easy to read. The month and year of the newsletter, plus the name of the editor, MUST appear on the first page.

BUILDING OF VITAL LIONISM.....25

Newsletter should boost the clubs in the zone, acknowledge and aid the causes of the Zone, District, the Multiple District and Lions International. Newsletter should be considered a promotional tool for Lions Clubs.

CONTENT..... 25

Newsletter to include promotion of all clubs in zone, matters of interest to all Lions, Lions projects of the Zone, District, MD19 and Lions Clubs International, upcoming Zone meetings and club events, and promotion of District Conference and MD19 Convention.

SETTING OF HIGH STANDARDS.....25

The newsletter will be well-written, well-edited and headlined using good spelling and grammar with the ideas in the articles expressed clearly and simply and using headlines to make the reader want to read the articles.
